"I saw how important it was for these students to learn English and learn it quickly to help them keep up with their academics," she says. That affirmed her decision to change careers.

"When I saw how hard these children worked to learn the language, I realized this was the right place for me to be."

Her seven years as a resource teacher were followed by several administrative positions for Central Unified. She culminated her 20 years with the district as the associate superintendent of Educational Services.

She left in 2007 to serve as the superintendent for Golden Valley Unified School District, where she led the district to high levels of academic excellence. In 2011, she took over as superintendent of the Tulare Joint Union High School District. She calls both experiences "absolutely incredible."

"As superintendent, it gives me an opportunity to be able to craft and implement a vision that can ultimately impact every student and staff member in my district," she says. "What gives me great satisfaction is that I am in a position in which I can shape the future of our education and community."

She sees earning a high school diploma as the first finish line for students in their educational careers. "I want to see every student cross that finish line with the ability to choose college or a career and have exposure to 21st century learning skills."

New to the Tulare district's educational opportunities is an improved focus on Career Technical Education through Linked Learning Pathways, which offers four academic pathways focusing on possible careers in agricultural sciences, engineering, pre-med, and digital and performing arts. The program introduces students to the various fields and even places them in paid and unpaid internships within the community. She says the program is popular, and student interest and excitement are growing each year.

She is also proud of the district's close ties to the Tulare County agricultural community. One endeavor that supports ag education is an enterprise farm and dairy that allows students to farm part of their 90-acre site growing wheat and corn and also a dairy operation raising cows and selling the milk to Land O'Lakes, an agricultural cooperative. In addition, the district's Future Farmers of America students perennially win many awards at local, state and national competitions.

Her district also partners with the College of the Sequoias Tulare College Center allowing students to earn college credit while in high school.

She says the district's philosophy is providing as many opportunities as possible to find paths for academic success. Another goal is teaching students "soft skills" – getting to work on time, honing communications skills, and completing tasks – to make them

productive and successful employees.

Sarah, who has been an EECU member for about 25 years, is grateful for the credit union's sponsorships and programs that support schools around the Valley. Educating students takes a community effort, she says.

"We really can't do it by ourselves. We need collaborations and partnerships, and EECU is at the top of that list."

She says Tulare residents are excited about the opening of an EECU branch in their town, which will enhance the credit union's presence in the community.

In her personal life, Sarah is married to Wayne Koligian, a retired Central Unified teacher and coach, who now works for Paramount Citrus in ag business development. The couple have four children ages 18 to 30. Sarah is a "fitness buff" and ran her first half marathon earlier this year. She and her family are active members of the First Armenian Presbyterian Church.

Balancing her busy professional and personal lives is something she relishes. "I'm most productive and happiest when I have multiple balls in the air."

From the moment employees begin their employment, they receive training to develop knowledge and skills to be effective, competent and confident.

"We want to create a positive member experience and to do that we focus on making sure our employees are welltrained and educated, and they have the proper resources available," she says.

EECU also has several staff incentive programs that encourage healthy lifestyles and laud employees for their work. The credit union's support of a healthy workplace and home life for employees was affirmed when EECU was honored with a 2014 Child-Friendly Business Award presented by First 5 Fresno County.

Janet began her nearly 23-year EECU career as a training specialist and eventually was promoted to HR/

training director, a position she has had for the past 10 years. She measures success in her role when she receives feedback from employees who have "aha" moments that connect to what she and her team have taught in a class or through resources they have provided.

"The most rewarding aspect of my job is when I know that I had some small part in making a difference for them," she says.

Away from the office, she has a passion for interior decorating, collecting antiques and traveling, especially to the Central Coast and Bay Area. She is an avid sports fan, closely following NASCAR and IndyCar races, and the San Francisco Giants, San Francisco 49ers and Golden State Warriors. She also attends yoga and Pilates classes and volunteers her time with various organizations.

Janet cherishes spending time with her husband, Gary — they have been married 37 years — and their daughters and families, and her 17-month-old granddaughter, Sophie Grace. She absolutely loves her role as a grandmother.

"Seeing life through the eyes of a child is a precious gift," she says. "It reminds me of pure innocence and keeps me grounded."
